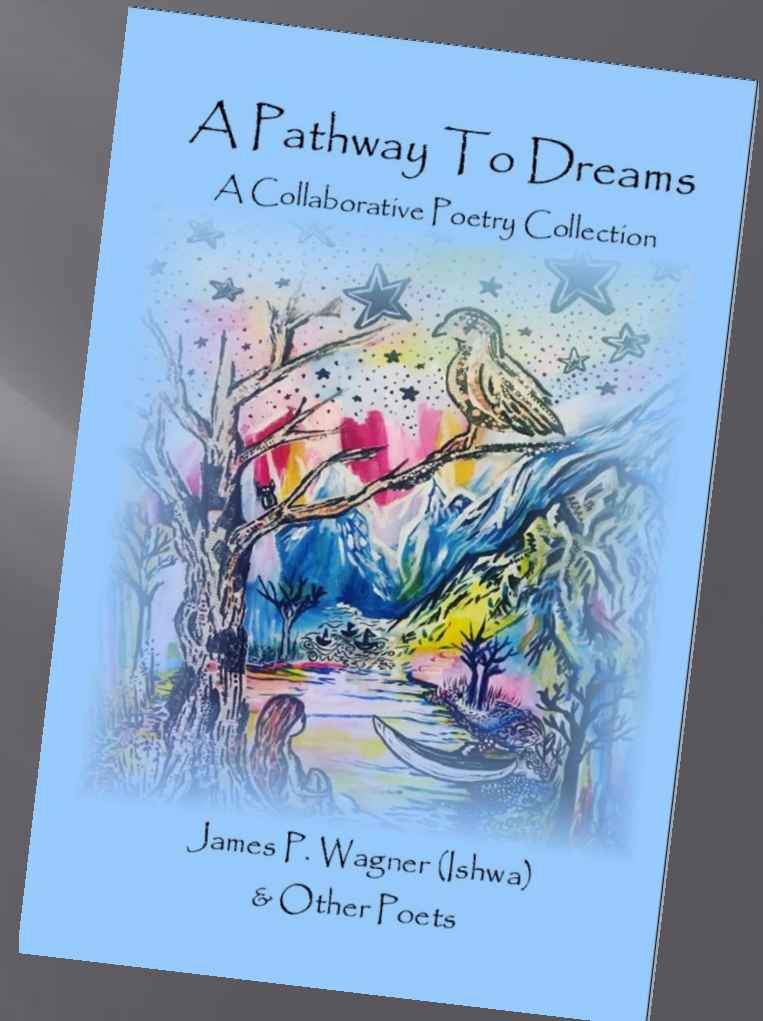

- ▣ Over 95% of started books, whether poetry, fiction or non-fiction never see the completion of their first draft.

- ▣ Have pieces of it been published before?
- ▣ Have you had others take a look at it and give feedback?



# The Difference Between Publishing and Self-Publishing

## ▣ Publishing:

- You submit your book for approval
- They get it printed
- They get it formatted
- They help with or create the cover art
- They help you sell it

## ▣ Self-Publishing:

- You get your book printed yourself.
- You make sure it's formatted
- You get the cover art
- You sell it yourself

# The History of Publishing

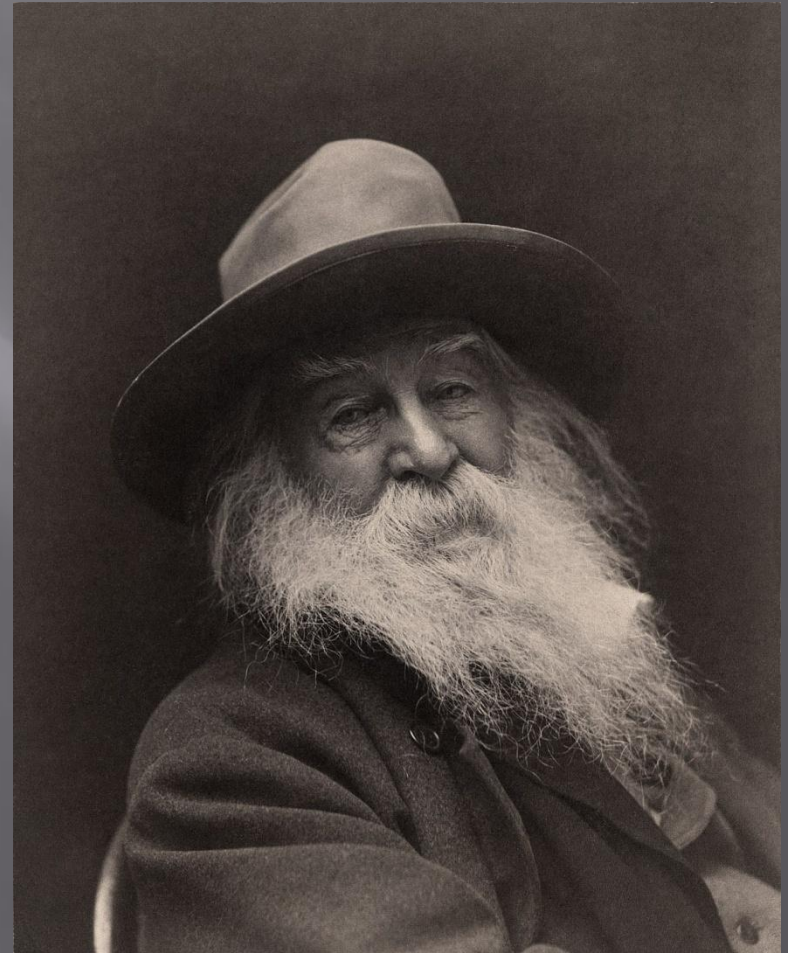
- ▣ For quite a lot of history the differences between printing and publishing were minimal.
- ▣ Most printers were also publishers — having a book store attached to the printing shop where they sold books.
- ▣ 20<sup>th</sup> Century Distribution and big bookstore chains altered the playing field and gave big publishers the supremacy.
- ▣ 21<sup>st</sup> Century models have changed this back to be more similar to the old way.

Contracts of who paid for the printing varied greatly.

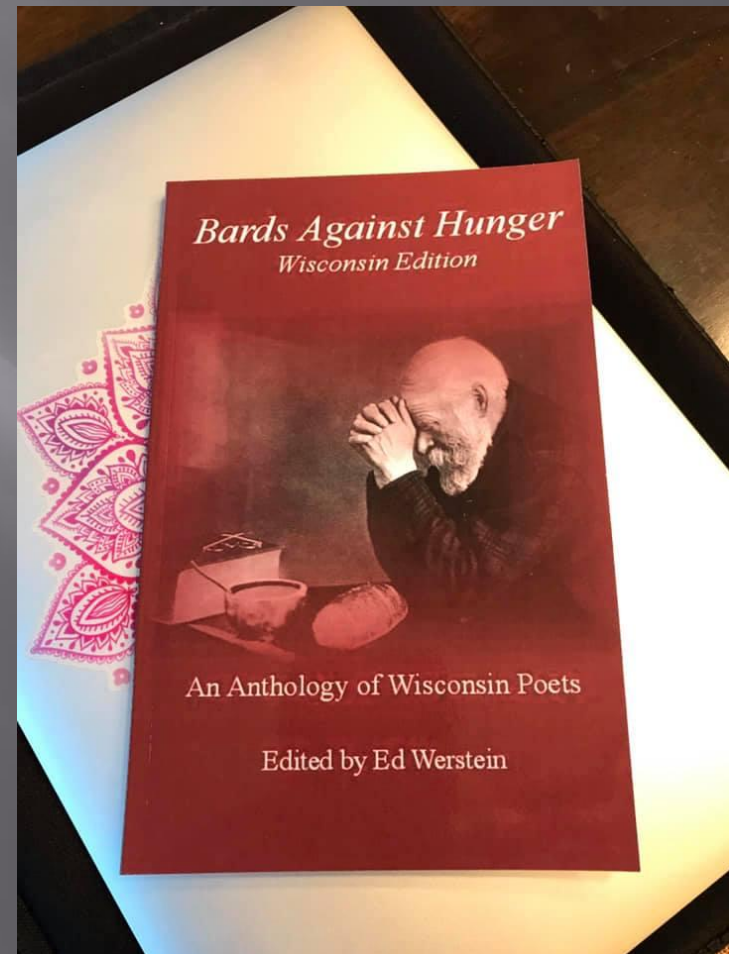
# Things To Remember If You Are Going To Self-Publish

- ▣ You are responsible for everything yourself, from getting it printed correctly, to selling and distributing it.
- ▣ Publishers handle things like formatting and cover-art, printers will not. Printers will print exactly what you send them.
- ▣ The cost of printing the books comes from you.



# The Manuscript

- ❑ Like with publishing you can't do it without the book.
- ❑ Make sure the book is ready.
- ❑ Instead of submitting it to a publisher for review you will need to submit it properly formatted to the printer's specs.



# Formatting

- ▣ If you are going to a printer you need to submit your manuscript how they request it.
- ▣ Usually they will print whatever you give them once you sign off on it—no editing, no formatting.
- ▣ You can format a book to the right specs yourself, or hire someone to do it
- ▣ Some self-publishing printers have formatting services you can use.

# Cover-Art

- ▣ The printer will not make the cover art for you.
- ▣ Some printing services have a cover-design template you can use — but you need a photo to start.
- ▣ You can also hire someone to do cover art for you, Upwork.com, other online service websites.
- ▣ Some places that offer self-publishing services might have cover design services.

# Blurbs or Testimonials

- ▣ Other poets, authors, professors, anyone in the field who might give a positive review of your book.
- ▣ Usually publishers find these for you, or suggest people, you would have to find them on your own.
- ▣ Not a necessary step, but still strongly suggested, especially for self-published books these can really help.

    - ▣ Trade paperback?
    - ▣ Mass Market paperback?
  - Hardcover?
  - Chapbook?
  - eBook?



# Different Printers Have Different Specialties

- ❑ Some printers are better for different types of books.
- ❑ Some can handle photos and color pages
- ❑ Some can do hard cover
- ❑ Some can do paperbacks

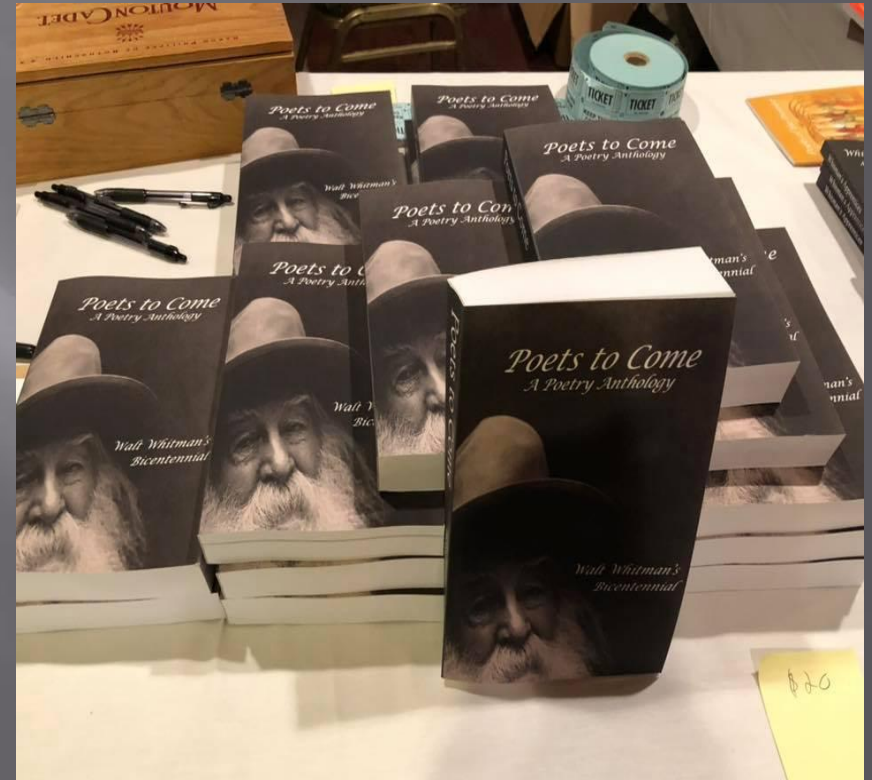


# Each Printer Will Have A Different Procedure

- ▣ There will be a specific way each printer wants to get the files for printing.
- ▣ Some self-publishing websites have a convenient client to upload the documents.
- ▣ Brick and mortar printers might want the files via email or USB drive.
- ▣ Follow the specific directions.

# How Many Copies?

- ❑ How many copies should you start with?
- ❑ The average self-published book sells less than 100 copies.
- ❑ Do you have a following? Do you have readings you attend?
- ❑ Order enough to last 6 months to a year.
- ❑ Don't order so many that you will have boxes in your garage for years.



# Warnings on Scams and Bad Deals

- ▣ There are a lot of “self-publishing” packages and services out there — some that cost thousands of dollars.
- ▣ Some of these packages have minimums of 1000 or more copies — in the age of print on demand, minimums that high aren't necessary.
- ▣ They pad the package with other merchandise, bookmarks, postcards, and many other things that may or may not be necessary.
